25) at 7:30 p.m. to consider proposed modified site plans and an exterior sign package submitted to the town by Lago Resort & Casino. The modified site plan documents include proposed amendments to the site plan that was initially approved with conditions by the town board June 12, 2014, and later approved by the town board with certain amendments with conditions Aug. 21, 2014. The changes include reconfiguring the parking garage, adding a maintenance building and moving the day care center to the east.

The town board will also consider the modified site plan documents at its regular town board meeting July 16, 7:30 p.m., in the Band Hall Building.

A copy of the proposed modified site plan document is available for public review at the Town of Tyre Town Clerk's Office, 636 Sutterby Road, during normal

business hours, and at the Seneca Falls Public Library.

Last Thursday (June 18), the board approved three local laws – adopting new procedures for site plan reviews relative to commercial and residential development, incorporating subdivision regulations into the zoning code and requiring existing or proposed dog kennels to obtain a permit from the town. ## ARC receives autism grant

Seneca Cayuga ARC has been awarded a \$2,500 grant by Polisseni Foundation of Pittsford. The grant was given to support ARC's Rural Autism Initiative, a program created to address the shortage of services for children who have autism and who reside in the Finger Lakes region. The Initiative will provide a full range of services such as local diagnostic testing at an early age, customized behavioral intervention for the family and ongoing individualized support from clinical staff

to ensure family stability.

ARC Executive Director Kevin Smith expressed his gratitude to trustees of the Polisseni Foundation for "recognizing the importance of these services to families in Seneca, Cayuga and surrounding counties by providing financial support to assist ARC in delivering these services to the many who are in need." ARC has also received a \$50,000 grant from the B. Thomas Golisano Foundation and a \$5,000 grant from the J. M. McDonald Foundation to assist in this initiative.

According to the Center for Disease Control, one in 68 children will be diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder in 2015. In Ontario, Seneca, Cayuga and Yates counties, that translates into an estimated 1,300 individuals, of which only 25% are receiving local services. Seneca Cayuga ARC has partnered with Ontario ARC to deliver these specialized services to individuals who live in these four counties. Both organizations are deeply grateful for this most recent show of support.
