Trevor's Gift marks 20,000-bag milestone

WATERLOO — In December, the Trevor's Gift backpack feeding program distributed its 20,000th bag of food to a nutritionally needy Waterloo child. Eligible Waterloo schoolchildren receive a bag of food in their backpacks each Friday to provide weekend nourishment when they don't have access to school cafeteria food. The program, which Doris Wolf and Kaaren Gerlach founded in 2010, currently serves 135-145 children a week. The food is purchased from Foodlink in Rochester. "We are so grateful to the businesses, organizations and people in Waterloo who have made it possible to help feed our hungry children," Wolf said. Studies have shown that good nutrition boosts children's focus, attendance and self-esteem. Wolf praised the program's longtime supporters. She cited the Waterloo Fire Department Auxiliary, which sends a check every month, and Seneca

Meadows Landfill, a major three-year sponsor. She also mentioned Waterloo High School Interact Club members, who pack and deliver extra bags of food at Christmas and when school is on vacation for more than a week. Don Peters, John King, Caren Cleaveland, Jim Patsos and Kathy Sigrist were recognized for driving the food from the Waterloo Baptist Church storage area to the schools. "This year, we learned that the grants through Foodlink that have helped support our program the past two years would end," Wolf said. "We were really concerned that the program would have to be curtailed, but the people of Waterloo came through to ensure that our children would be provided for." It costs Trevor's Gift \$20 to feed a child for a month and \$200 for a school year.
