

## Literacy equals opportunities

As the summer winds to an end and the new school year begins, our focus turns to education. But while young students are back in school, millions of American adults also are in a different form of a classroom – and taking advantage of literacy tutoring.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) established Sept. 8 as International Literacy Day in 1965 to call attention to the world-wide issues of illiteracy. It reminds us illiteracy is a global issue, contributing to unemployment, poverty and many other social and societal problems.

Literacy Volunteers of Seneca County, an affiliate of Literacy New York, is joining other adult education providers to raise awareness and celebrate literacy.

“We have a saying in New York: ‘Literacy Leads.’ Literacy leads to employment. It leads to independence. It leads to opportunity,” said Arline Marino, executive director of Literacy Volunteers of Seneca County.

IT IS MORE likely for children to have low literacy in homes where parents have low-educational levels. Children who live in homes where literacy is valued demonstrate higher reading levels at an early age. Children who have low literacy levels become adults who lack literacy skills.

In New York, an estimated 2.7 million adults lack basic literacy, math and employment skills. Low-level reading and math skills are linked to poverty, incarceration and dropout rates. These individuals

may also lack basic health, financial and consumer literacy, according to Literacy New York, which serves more than 6,500 adults each year through a network of 34 affiliates and their volunteers.

But too many New Yorkers are not receiving adult education to improve their literacy skills, despite our efforts.

Literacy Volunteers of Seneca County serves 22 adult learners each year with the help of 17 volunteers, said Program Director Kaaren Gerlach. For some, that means help in reading, for others, it is assistance in earning a high school equivalency diploma. Two students have worked with tutors to become American citizens.

ASKED HOW MANY more students could be served locally, Marino replied, “The program is student driven. We can handle as many students as request our services.”

Gerlach agreed. “Some people don’t ask for help because they are embarrassed that they can’t read or do basic math. It’s an individual decision. The student has to make a commitment to literacy. For some people transportation is an issue.”

Gerlach said the organization always welcomes volunteer tutors. A training session is scheduled to begin in October. Call (315) 539-1795 for more information or to register.

The historic Seneca Knitting Mill, an 1844 limestone structure located in Seneca Falls, is being transformed into that Center and will also serve as the new home of the National Women’s Hall of Fame.

During 2014, the mill structure has been stabilized, abatement has been conducted and a new roof is being installed. The Center for Great Women will create a future home for the National Women’s Hall of Fame while preserving the architectural history of the early mills of New York State and honoring those who worked

Seneca Meadows joins other major supporters including the Town of Seneca Falls, ITT, Generations Bank, Rochester Area Community Foundation, Sessler Corporation and individual major donors. The Center has also received multiple grants, which include those from the National Park Service Save America’s Treasure’s program, the New York State Environmental Protection Fund administered by the New York State Parks department, and from York Empire State Development Corporation (Restore New York). The grants total nearly \$4 million. All are matching grants that require the Hall to raise equivalent support through fundraising campaigns from local, regional, and national donors. The total project will require \$25 million.
